Arguments for Casino

- Threased Revenues
- Creation of Jobs
- Enhanced Tourism



Increased Revenues?

- A casino in Kitchener will increase revenues for the city
- At the same time, casino will result in increased expenditures on social problems in the community for:
 - ★ Individuals
 - ★ Community as a whole
 - Public services



Individual costs

- ☆ Increases stress
- Harms financial well-being
- Linked with increased risk behavior
- Contributes to job losses and lost work productivity
- Linked with addiction & depression
- Can lead to inability to pay for essential items like food and housing
- Linked to family break up



Community Costs

- **⇔**Business loss
- **∜**Violence
- **☆Fraud**
- **☆Theft**
- **⇔**Homelessness



Public Service Costs

☆Increased need for

- Medical care
- Policing
- Courts and prisons
- Social assistance
- Community social services



Job Creation?

A Casino will create more jobs

Many of the jobs associated with casinos are:

- construction jobs are temporary and mostly for male
- relatively low wage and low skill (e.g., cleaning, hospitality)
- precarious (limited social benefits, insecure, low wages, high risks of ill health)
- Staff in casinos have three times higher risk of problem gambling



Tourism Development?

- A casino will bring in tourism dollars to businesses beyond the casino
- Casinos that are designed to be self contained tourist experiences do not encourage spending outside of their walls
- Other businesses may earn less if local people redirect their spending to a casino
- Saturation will result from building too many
- Local costs will be high because local people have greater risks related to gambling



Where Casino Profits Come From

- Problem gamblers contribute a disproportionately high share of gaming revenues
 - 2006 study: estimated that between 30 and 40 per cent of gambling revenues are derived from problem gamblers
 - 2003 study: problem gamblers (4.8% of population) generated 36% of gambling revenues



Problem Gambling

☆ 66% of Ontarians report gambling within previous 12 months, most are low-risk

☆ Problem gamblers:

- Gamble more than 2 to 3 times a month
- Spend more than 1 per cent of gross family income on gambling



Populations at Greater Risk

- Not all populations are at equal risk of problem gambling.
- High risk populations include:
 - People living in poverty
 - New Canadians
 - Seniors, those on fixed incomes
 - Young people, also on fixed incomes



Cost-Benefit Ratio

Estimated annual cost associated with each problem gambler: \$20,000 to \$56,000.

☆9% of Kitchener population is low income (201,335); higher rate than any other municipality in Waterloo Region.



Final Statement

- The member organizations of Poverty Free KW do not support a casino
- All evidence suggests that casinos profits do not out-weight the costs
- ∜Vulnerable populations are at greater risk of problem gambling
- To be responsible, Kitchener Council should not support any action to have a casino in or near Waterloo Region
